Advent Meditation

For those of us involved in the church or God thing, the four Sundays prior to Christmas mark the season of Advent. Considered to be the beginning of the church year, it is a time of preparation for Jesus to enter our lives: heart, body, mind, and soul. We are to move a bit slower, think deeply about things that make life matter, and wait. Wait for the coming of

a promise of life, even if the particulars are not ours to know.

It is by and large ignored by pretty much everyone else and frankly even most Christians. The pull of Santa Claus, Christmas presents, Black Friday observances that now begin in July—at least at Costco, is just too much. All these things are at

once seductive and anxiety-producing. Who has time to slow down? Who wants to?

While this may seem somewhat sacrilegious to say, especially for a priest, in some ways I've appreciated this overlooking of Advent. Those of us who do observe it are generally left alone to contemplate what, and who, we are

preparing for. To take stock of the last year and ponder what a new year may bring.

Certainly, these musings are not only the providence of Christians. There is something about these longer nights and colder days that seems to invite this kind of contemplation. It is almost as if we

> need this time to slow down, be quiet, and just be. Look out and wonder what is possible.

Barbara Brown Taylor in her book Learning to Walk in the Dark writes, "I have learned things in the dark that I could have never learned in the light, things that have saved my life over and over so that there is really

only one logical conclusion. I need the darkness as much as I need light."

However, a couple of years ago my peace with this overlooked time was cut short. Looking over a circular for Target in the morning paper I saw an ad for an electronic Advent Calendar in the shape

of the Christmas tree with little lights for each day leading up to Christmas. Darn I thought. Christmas wasn't enough—now "they" have to have Advent too (whoever "they" are).

And yet . . . of course they do. We all do. We all need Advent. Unless we truly stop, if even for a short time and recall what is important—not what others tell us is important—but what we know in the very depths of who we are is important. What really gives us life; makes us happy; doesn't exploit or harm others or our world; brings us peace, and allows us to see each other with grace rather than envy or suspicion.

So together let us claim this season of Advent as one in which we choose to be kind to each other and ourselves; let us claim this time of preparation to help us look forward to the year ahead, concerned with justice, not revenge, concerned with earth care not accommodation, concerned with helping each other thrive not just get by; let us claim a new beginning with thanksgiving, wonder, and curiosity; let us claim, as followers of Jesus, our pilgrimage of faith.

Blessed Christmas will be here before we know it. For now, let us allow ourselves to dream what is about to be born.

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Christmas Carols: Why They Are Our Favorite

"O Come, All Ye Faithful." "Joy to the World". "What Child is This?" "Once in Royal David's City." "Silent Night." And the list goes on.

Have you ever wondered why we feel such an emotional connection to Christmas carols compared to other types of sacred music? There seems to be that je ne sais quoi factor when it comes to Christmas music, but perhaps it is more quantifiable and physiological than we may think. I certainly consider myself to be a Christmas 'junkie,' as I love all things Christmas from tinsel to Tiny Tim. I love listening to King's College, Cambridge sing their annual Festival of Lessons and Carols, and I always stop in the mall to listen to the beautiful harmonies of carolers. But it's also in the humanity that we experience during this time of year, where people draw nearer to each other and to the divine, that we find the true magic of the season.

I find that we are instantly drawn to Christmas music for several reasons. First, it "comes but once a year," so it is not as stale as other types of music that play year-round, and we yearn for the contrast that it provides. Secondly, it is almost exclusively positive in its language, and texts concerning nativity can be very comforting and can resonate with peoples from all walks of life. But there are deeper musicological reasons that can be considered, such as the constancy of diatonic relationships in Christmas carols, meaning that these pieces almost never stray far from predictable harmonic progressions and melodies. There is almost always a consistent key or musical home-base, and almost all are composed in major, or upbeat-sounding, keys. I always refer to G Major as the 'Christmas key,' as several of our favorite Carols are composed or oft-utilized in G, and its sonic quality gives a shimmering feel. In fact, individuals who have synesthesia, or who can see colors in music, see G major as green, which complements the commercial color usually used for Christmastide.

I will admit, however, that these musical figures can certainly apply to other types of music as well, but I still think that there is one more argument to consider when it comes to music of the nativity. Because Jesus' birth is at the heart of our Christian beliefs, I think there is an inherent aura of fascination surrounding music set to texts concerning the story, and our ears and hearts are magnetically pulled toward it. Whether it is a glorious rendition of "Hark the Herald Angels Sing," with organ, strings, and brass, a choir delicately singing "The Coventry Carol", or a soloist performing "Mary, Did You Know" with

guitar, I think our core beliefs revolving around the Christmas story create a visceral emotional connection to these sounds that is uncontrollable.

What are your favorite Christmas carols? Do you feel a similar experience when you listen to them compared to other types of sacred music? There may be more to it than meets the ear. Come to our annual Festival of Lessons and Carols on December 22, at 4 p.m. to join in the music of the season, and open your heart once again to the joy of Christmas.

Courtney previously worked in our nation's capital as a personal assistant. The atmosphere is very different in Southern California compared to the East Coast, but she's loving it here.


Courtney has been a part of ministries all over the world and worked in youth ministry in Texas and Indiana.


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Being Mortal: The Discussion of End of Life Issues

On Tuesday, October 29, St. Bart's presented a video entitled *Being Mortal* followed by a panel discussion. This video is based on the bestselling book by Dr. Atul Gawande, a doctor telling his journey in working with patients nearing the end of their life. *Being Mortal* not only shows Dr. Gawande's experiences but also focuses on how untrained and uncomfortable doctors are in talking with their patients about death.

Fifteen people participated in a lively discussion with panel members Arlene Cramer, Nurse Practitioner who works in palliative care, Joe Mayer, a pastoral counselor with experience in hospice work, and the Rev. Canon Allisyn Thomas. The themes that emerged were how difficult it is to talk about end of life issues, why people tend to avoid them, and how



important it is to have these discussions with family members while still healthy. Although a difficult topic and often avoided, feedback from the evening was very positive.

St. Bart's is in the process of developing an End of Live program beginning in January. We will start with a reshowing of *Being Mortal* along with a panel since this was so positively received by those in attendance. Other classes will focus on how to have difficult discussions, Advance Directives, the importance of POLST (Planning Your Own Funeral) class, and caregiver support. Other topics will be announced in the near future. Stay tuned for more information on this series.
